Create a Family Calendar

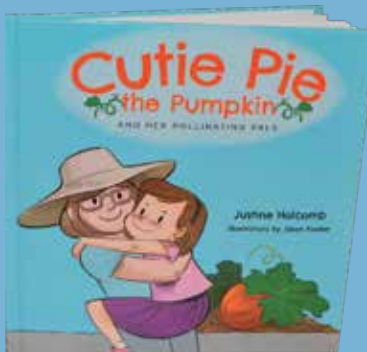

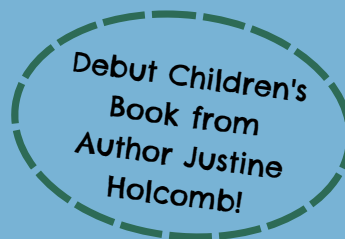

TURN TO WHOLE GRAINS FOR A NUTRITIONAL BOOST

(Family Features) Nutritious eating, including smarter snacking, is an important way to protect your heart and maintain overall health and wellness. While many people understand the basics of healthy eating – avoiding too many sugary treats, for example – some are confused about important food categories that can impact nutrition.

According to a survey conducted by The Harris Poll on behalf of the American Heart Association, U.S. adults are least knowledgeable about refined vs. whole grains compared to other food categories like fruits, vegetables and proteins. Whole grains are, in fact, a key feature of the Association's recommendations for a heart-healthy diet.

There are two types of grain products: whole grains, which contain the entire grain, and refined grains, which have been milled into a finer texture like flour or meal. Most adults, according to the survey, are able to distinguish whole vs. refined grains. However, there are a few misperceptions.

Date Nut Granola Bars

Recipe courtesy of the American Heart Association and Sorghum Checkoff

Servings: 12 (1 bar per serving)

Nonstick cooking spray

- 1 1/2 cups rolled oats
- 1/4 cup almond slices or whole almonds, coarsely chopped
- 1/4 cup shelled pistachios, coarsely chopped
- 1 cup pitted dates
- 1/2 cup unsweetened dried cranberries
- 1/4 cup uncooked whole-grain sorghum
- 1/4 cup honey
- 1/4 cup low-sodium peanut butter
- 1 teaspoon vanilla extract
- 1/8 teaspoon salt

Preheat oven to 350 F.

Most incorrectly believe multi-grain bread is a whole grain. Additionally, only 17% believe sorghum is an example of a whole grain when it is, in fact, a whole grain option. Whole grains like sorghum, oatmeal and brown rice are rich sources of dietary fiber, may improve blood cholesterol levels and provide nutrients that help the body form new cells, regulate the thyroid and maintain a healthy immune system.

These sweet, chewy Date Nut Granola Bars from the American Heart Association's Healthy for Good initiative, supported by the Sorghum Checkoff, are a perfect go-to snack for enjoying throughout the week. Popped sorghum adds a surprise ingredient for crunchy texture while dry-roasted oats and nuts provide a delicious, toasted flavor.

Line bottom and sides of 8-inch square baking pan with plastic wrap or parchment paper. Lightly spray with nonstick cooking spray.

On large baking sheet, spread oats, almonds and pistachios in single layer. Bake 10-15 minutes, or until lightly brown, stirring occasionally. Let cool slightly.

In food processor or blender, process dates and cranberries 1-1 1/2 minutes, or until chopped and clumpy. Transfer to large bowl.

Put 2 tablespoons sorghum in silicone microwaveable bowl or clean, brown paper bag. If using microwaveable bowl, cover with lid. If using paper bag, roll shut and place on microwaveable dinner plate with fold facing down. Microwave on high 2 minutes, or until there are more than 10 seconds between pops. Repeat with remaining sorghum, microwaving 1 1/2 minutes, or until more than 10 seconds between pops.

Stir popped sorghum, oats, almonds and pistachios into date mixture.

In small saucepan over low heat, heat honey and peanut butter 5 minutes, or until peanut butter is smooth and mixture is warmed, stirring occasionally. Remove from heat. Stir in vanilla and salt.

Pour peanut butter mixture over date mixture, stirring to break into small clumps. Transfer half to baking pan. Using bottom of drinking glass or fingers lightly sprayed with nonstick cooking spray, press down firmly to flatten and pack tightly so clumps adhere to each other. Repeat with remaining half. Freeze, covered, about 1 hour, to firm.

Place cutting board over pan. Turn pan over. Discard plastic wrap. Using knife, cut into 12 bars. Refrigerate leftovers in airtight container up to 1 week.

MANAGE HEART HEALTH FOR STRONGER BRAIN HEALTH

(Family Features) The same risk factors that contribute to making heart disease the leading cause of death worldwide also impact the rising global prevalence of brain disease, including stroke, Alzheimer's disease and dementia.

The global death rate from Alzheimer's disease and other dementias is increasing even more than the rate of heart disease death, according to the American Heart Association's Heart Disease and Stroke Statistics 2022 Update.

Globally, more than 54 million people had Alzheimer's disease and other dementias in 2020, a 37% increase since 2010 and 144% increase over the past 30 years (1990-2020). Additionally, more than 1.89 million deaths were attributed to Alzheimer's disease and other dementias

worldwide in 2020, compared to nearly 9 million deaths from heart disease.

"The global rate of brain disease is quickly outpacing heart disease," said Mitchell S.V. Elkind, M.D. M.S., FAHA, the past president of the American Heart Association (2020-21), a professor of neurology and epidemiology at Columbia University's Vagelos College of Physicians and Surgeons and attending neurologist at New York-Presbyterian/Columbia University Irving Medical Center. "We are learning more about how some types of dementia are related to aging, and how some types are due to poor vascular health. It's becoming more evident that reducing vascular disease risk factors can make a real difference in helping people live longer, healthier lives, free of heart disease and brain disease."



According to the statistics update, people with midlife hypertension were five times more likely to experience impairment on global cognition and about twice as likely to experience reduced executive function, dementia and Alzheimer's disease. The risk for dementia associated with heart failure was nearly two-fold.

Experts recommend maintaining a healthy weight, managing your blood pressure and following other heart-healthy lifestyle behaviors that can also support good brain health while studies show maintaining good vascular health is associated with healthy aging and retained cognitive function.

Optimal brain health includes the ability to perform tasks like movement, perception, learning and memory, communication, problem solving, judgment, decision making and emotion. Cognitive decline and dementia are often seen following stroke or cerebrovascular disease and indicate a decline in brain health.

Consider these steps to live a healthier lifestyle and protect your heart and brain health:

- Don't smoke; avoid secondhand smoke.
- Reach and maintain a healthy weight. Be mindful of your eating habits; eat foods low in saturated fat, trans fat, sodium and added sugars.
- Be physically active. Start slowly and build up to at least 150 minutes of moderate physical activity (such as brisk walking) each week. As an alternative, you can do 75 minutes of vigorous physical activity, or a combination of the two, to improve overall cardiovascular health.
- Get your blood pressure checked regularly and work with your health care team to manage it if it's high.
- Have regular medical checkups and take your medicine as directed.
- Decrease your stress level and seek emotional support when needed.

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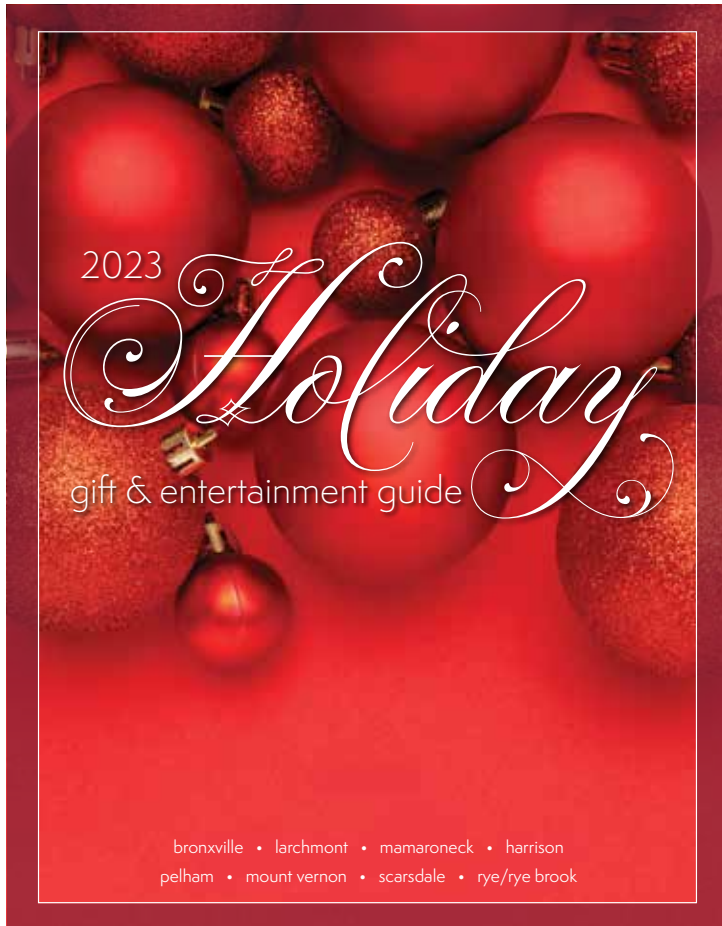

HOW TO PAINT INTERIOR WALLS

Are you ready to learn how to paint walls? With the right tools and the right paint, you'll go from painting for beginners to proud DIY-er in no time. The best paints for interior walls will cover properly prepared surfaces in fewer coats, but beware of bargain paints claiming good coverage at too-good-to-be-true prices. The Best Way to Paint Walls

When it comes to home interiors, there really is no "fast and easy" way to paint walls. Two ways to ensure your painting project is a success: properly prepare the surface and take your time. Remember to read all labels and follow all instructions carefully.

Painting walls does not need to be difficult. Our How To Paint Walls video (https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=g7SReg-IH_o) not only shows you how to paint a room, but gives you the interior painting tips that will help you achieve excellent results.

Step #1: Select the Right Tools for Painting Walls

The right tools are important.

Here's what you'll need:

- High-quality roller sleeve and handle; use...
 - a 3/8-inch sleeve for most finishes
 - a 1/4-inch sleeve for glossy finishes
 - a thicker, 1/2- or 3/4-inch sleeve for rougher, textured walls
 - Wash and dry roller sleeves to remove any loose fibers prior to painting



Other painting tools you'll need include a pan, an extension pole and a stepladder.

You'll also need quality paint, like premium Aura® Interior, Regal® Select Interior, a favorite of homeowners and painting professionals, or ben® Interior, a paint formulated specifically to help DIY-ers with quick-fix drips and smooth touch-ups.

Step #2: Prepare the Wall Surface

Preparing the walls of the room is always critical to a successful paint job, starting with cleaning. Most walls can be washed using a sponge and warm water. If there is mildew, be sure to remove it completely. Priming is also essential; be sure to ask your local Benjamin Moore retailer for a deep base primer if painting a darker hue.



Step #3: Cut in the Room

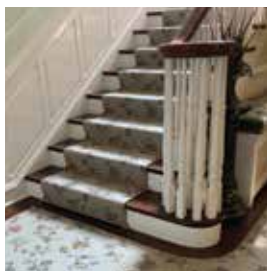
When you paint a room, you have to "cut in" with a 2½-inch angle sash brush. Cutting in with a paint brush is when you paint along the ceiling line, corners, windows, doors, molding, outlets and switches prior to using a roller.

Step #4: Load Your Roller

Place a liner in your paint tray, and carefully pour paint into the tray. Begin loading your roller by rolling it along the raised roll-off area of the pan. Touch the paint, but do so without completely immersing the sleeve. Repeat this motion until the roller is fully saturated.

Step #5: Start Rolling

Start each section rolling from the top down first, overlapping each row about 3-5 inches. Apply only light pressure, letting the roller and the paint do the work. If you press too hard, you may create drips and runs.

Step #6: Reload and Avoid Streaks

Every time you reload the roller, begin a new row on an unpainted area and work back into the previously painted row. Your extension pole should be long enough to allow you to reach the highest and lowest points of the wall comfortably.

Painting walls without streaks is one important technique to master; start by steering clear of painting too large a space at one time. Painting manageable-sized areas will help you maintain a “wet edge”—the application of paint toward the unpainted area and then back into the just-painted surface—which will ultimately produce a smooth, uniform appearance and help to prevent lap marks.

Step #7: Let Dry, Recoat, and Let Dry Again

We recommend at least two coats of your topcoat product for



optimal hide and color development. Check the paint can for the recommended drying times and wait until the paint is completely dry before you add the second coat. Be sure to allow proper cure time before returning fixtures, wall plates or frames to the walls.

3 ENERGY-SAVING HOME IMPROVEMENT IDEAS

(Family Features) Making improvements around the house to curb energy usage is not only good for the environment, it can make a big impact on your utility bills, too.

Energy-efficient appliances are a good starting point as you work to reduce your home's overall energy usage. Depending on local tax laws, you may also qualify for tax incentives for these purchases.

There are also relatively simple DIY projects you can do around the house to improve energy conservation.

Seal air leaks. Gaps around windows, doors and other openings are major contributors to wasted energy. In the winter, they let cold air in, making your furnace work harder. Conversely, in the summer, cool air escapes and forces your air conditioner to run extra. In most cases, weather stripping or caulking can provide the necessary seal. Larger gaps may require low-expansion foam or minor drywall work. Remember to pay careful attention to the attic and basement, which can be unexpected sources of energy loss.

If replacing your door's threshold is impractical or your threshold is not adjustable, a door bottom or sweep may effectively keep out unwanted drafts. These options install directly on the door, eliminating the need to tinker with the threshold itself or remove the door for more significant alterations.

Update insulation. Deteriorating or minimal insulation, which is found more often in older homes, can make it difficult to effectively manage your home's temperature. While spray foam is a tempting solution that has less of an impact on your walls, it can be tricky for a novice to install correctly.

A simple and effective alternative is fiberglass batts or rolls, which can be easily cut to size and fit between studs and beams. While this approach requires sheetrock removal and re-installation, it's also one of the lowest cost options for insulation replacement.

Regulate temperatures. Over time, thermostats can become less sensitive, leading to inaccuracies and wasted energy. Installing a programmable thermostat is a cost-effective, easy fix. Choose a model that allows you to adjust temperature settings relative to your usage, saving energy and eliminating paying for cooled or heated air when you're not home.

For example, on summer days when you're not home, program your system to maintain a temperature 5-10 degrees F higher than is comfortable when you're present. Then set it to cool to your preferred temperature approximately 30 minutes or 1 hour prior to arriving home.

Harrison is a town/village situated 22 miles north of Manhattan with all the amenities people move to the suburbs for: quiet streets, convenient location, excellent schools, parks and recreation, and a great sense of community. Purchase, the historic area of Harrison, has beautiful homes, corporate parks, the State University of New York at Purchase and Manhattanville College.

A five member Town/Village Board, comprised of the Supervisor/Mayor and four Councilmen/Trustees elected at large, is the governing body of the Town/Village. It is responsible for the health, safety, and welfare of its residents. The Supervisor/Mayor is elected for a two year term and the Councilmen/Trustees serve for four year terms.

The Supervisor/Mayor is the Chief Fiscal Officer and the Chief Executive Officer of the Town. A Deputy Supervisor/Mayor is appointed to assist with the duties of the Supervisor/Mayor in his absence.

The Town Board is a legislative body responsible for setting policy, adopting the annual budget, approving contracts and expenditures, enacting laws and resolutions, and overseeing the general operation of the town.

Regular Town Board meetings are conducted twice a month, usually on the first and third Thursday at 7:00 PM, from September to May, and once a month, usually the first Thursday at 7:00, during the months of February, July, and August.

Outdoor activities are enjoyed in community parks and on school fields. Five day camp programs are conducted throughout the community during the summer months. Spring Egg Hunts, Halloween Programs, Summer Concerts, and Sports Tournaments are also held during the year. An annual "It's Great to Live in Harrison/ Columbus Day Celebration" is held in October.

Home to nationally recognized schools of excellence, Harrison strives for superior standards in education for its student population of over 3,600. There are four elementary schools teaching Grades K-5 -- The Harrison Avenue School, Parsons Memorial School, the Samuel J. Preston School and the Purchase School. The curriculum includes many innovative programs that provide the students with small classes and an impetus for learning. Full day kindergarten also is a highlight.

Louis M. Klein Middle School offers a rigorous and comprehensive academic program that is standards-based and meets the New York State Regents Policy Statement on Middle Level Education for Grades 6 through 8.

Harrison High School offers Honors, Regents and an academic curriculum for four years. With a comprehensive athletic program, the High School encourages students to participate in a wide variety of activities. A planetarium, media center and a school-wide computer program display Harrison's commitment to quality education.

Larchmont is a quaint village. It has an old-fashioned feel, as the coffee bars and small shops along the commercial streets attest, it has kept up-to-date. Part of the Town of Mamaroneck, it shares a school system and some services, but has its own government.

An elected Board of Trustees, composed of a Mayor and four Trustees, governs the Village. The Board is responsible for budget, public safety, sanitation, water, public works, community services, etc. There are two elected Village Justices. With the adoption of the referendum on Election Day, September 15, 2020, Village Elections will now take place with the General Elections on the first Tuesday in November annually. The Board meets once a month at Village Hall, the municipal building.

The Larchmont Chamber of Commerce is dedicated to promoting the business and civic interests of Larchmont. Connecting business to business through networking opportunities, professional speakers and participation in business development events is their goal.

The Community Service Office is open to Village of Larchmont and Town of Mamaroneck residents of all ages. It dispenses information and assistance in applying for government benefits and programs. This office can advise you about local rent regula-

tions, senior citizen rent increase exemptions, and landlord-tenant problem-solving. This agency also offers a Meals on Wheels program, a holiday giving program and updates on community and government programs.

The Junior League of Westchester on the Sound operates The Golden Shoestring with proceeds from the sale of donated and consignment clothing and household items funding Community and League projects.

The Larchmont Historical Society is a not-for-profit educational corporation by the New York State Board of Regents to discover, preserve and disseminate information concerning the natural, social and civic history of Larchmont and to promote the preservation of historical sites and structures.

During the Fall, the Recreation Department offers tennis clinics for players of all ages, along with Junior and Adult Platform Tennis. In the summer there is a day camp program, concerts and tennis programs at Flint Park. Special events include the Annual 5K Run, July 4th Festivities, Tour de Larchmont, Rag-a-muffin Parade and more. Recreational activities include the Larchmont-Mamaroneck Little League, the Larchmont Junior Soccer League, swimming at Hommocks Pool in the summer with a Town of Mamaroneck pool permit and ice skating at Hommocks Park Ice Rink.

Larchmont and neighboring Mamaroneck are served by the Mamaroneck Union Free School District. The district's four elementary schools, one middle school and one high school earn high marks for their comprehensive academic programs. The arts and athletic programs are exemplary. The school year calendar is the same as Mamaroneck's.

The City of New Rochelle has operated under a Council-Manager form of government since 1932. The two major components of this system are the City Council and the City Manager. The City Council is the legislative body, establishing City policies; the City Manager is the administrator, carrying out the directives of the Council. New Rochelle's City Council consists of a Mayor elected at large and six Council Members elected by district. The Mayor and Council Members serve 4 year terms.

The Mayor serves as a member and presiding officer of the Council. In addition to officiating at all City ceremonial functions, the Mayor takes an active role in promoting the City. The Mayor also appoints members of the Planning Board, Civil Service Commission and Parks and Recreation Advisory Committee. The City Manager, appointed by the Council, is the chief administrative officer of the City. It is the Manager's responsibility to supervise and coordinate the work of the departments, prepare and submit to Council an annual budget estimate, enforce City ordinances and state laws, and execute all contracts, leases and deeds authorized by Council. The City Manager keeps Council informed about the fiscal condition and future needs of the City and has the sole power to appoint and remove all heads of departments in the administrative services of the City.

The New Rochelle Public School District has 10 public schools. There are six elementary schools teaching grades K-5. There are two middle schools: Albert Leonard Middle School and Isaac Young Middle School.

New Rochelle High School is an all Regents High School offering a variety of courses in five major fields. Its curriculum reflects the expanding fields of knowledge, the shifting concerns and needs within society, and the changing needs and interests of its students. The courses provide a major sequence of study for students continuing their formal education beyond high school.

The Town of Rye is governed by a Supervisor and a four-person Council. They serve four-year terms and meet on the third Tuesday of every month.

The Rye Historical Society offers many community oriented programs that include guided house tours, changing exhibitions, family workshops, lectures, craft classes, demonstrations and trips. They have an extensive local history collection which is available to researchers by appointment.

Located at One Purchase Street, The Rye Historical Society's Square House Museum is a house rich in history with the rooms carefully restored to reflect the many and varied lifestyles of Colonial New York. For more information call 967-7588.

Rye Recreation sponsors activities and special events throughout the year. In October, children get to paint merchants' windows along the main streets. They also eagerly await the construction of the Haunted House each Halloween at the Recreation Center, located at 281 Midland Avenue.

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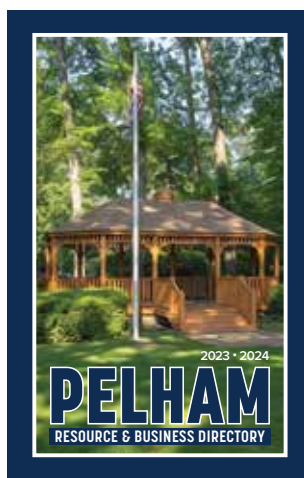

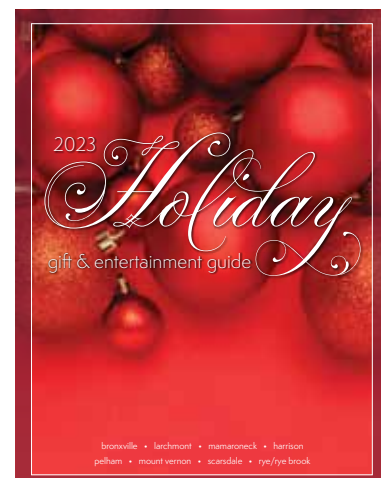
